BIG BOY VISITS KANSAS

The Union Pacific's famous articulated steam locomotive 4014 is the only operating "Big Boy" on the planet. As almost everyone knows, depending on how you measure it, the Big Boys were the largest steam locomotives ever built. The 4014 passed through our state as part of a nationwide tour commemorating the 150th anniversary of the completion of the transcontinental railroad. A number of members and friends of NMRA's Chisholm Trail Division were able to document at least part of this amazing journey. Here are some of their photos.
