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### FROM THE EDITOR'S DESK BY JIM MARLETT


The Wichita Train Show and Swap Meet for this year is over. For the planners and helpers life can get back to normal. Well, sort of. Planning for next year's show has already started. You'll no doubt hear more about that.

One nice thing for me is the show provides newsletter material. I call the March-April issue the "Train Show Issue," at least to myself if not in print.

Also in this issue will be something I forgot last issue – namely, a few photos of the Holiday Party and White Elephant Gift Exchange. Bob Neill sent a piece as well and the Modular Update is almost a regular column now.

The update on my own model railroad progress will be short this month. About all I did was a little revision of the Blakely yard to make things fit better, traced more lines from the track plan, smoothed the Homasote, and stained some ties. I also drew lines on the Homasote representing the ends of the ties. I use Fast Tracks sweeps of a different scale to do this. The Fast Tracks sweeps have windows in their centers that allow following a center line. You may have heard me drone on about this before, but I realized that sweeps for On3 were 3 feet wide in O scale, but were about 6 feet wide in HO scale. I have used six foot, six-and-a-half foot, and seven foot ties on my HOn3 track, as did a number of narrow gauge prototypes. Gluing a strip of wood to the outside edges of the On3 sweeps gives me about a six-and-a-half foot guide for my pencil. I can do a much better job of laying strips of ties by aligning their outer edges with those pairs of lines than I can trying to guess where they would fit on a center line. If you are laying flex track, that shouldn't be a problem for you, but us old school whackos that hand lay track need all the help we can get.



1) When we left off last issue, I had put three of the Blakely, Colorado tables together. This issue, I have printed out *most of the track plan areas* and adjusted them by cut and paste where needed to get the already installed turntable to line up. Then I traced the track plan onto the Homasote with a pounce wheel. Where tracks were straight with no switches. I didn't need to print the track plan. A straight edge was plenty good enough to connect the lines.



2) Here I am using one of my wife's pounce wheels to trace the track plan onto the Homasote. I had to be careful not to let the pounce wheel wonder off the line, but it was so much quicker than the push pin method I'd used before. Once transferred to the Homasote, the paper template came off and left dotted lines where the track should go.



4) These are some of the modified sweep sticks I used to help draw the lines for the ends of the ties. The lines on the roadbed are the second round of this after I leveled the divots in the Homasote with wood filler. The filler faded the first pencil lines. I normally don't need to smooth the Homasote, but this was a rough batch and I thought it needed a little help in the smoothness department.




3) Like shown in the last issue, I connected the dots with a pencil. This gave me centerlines to follow. The white spots are where I filled holes left from screwing a second sheet of plywood to the top of the Homasote and plywood sandwich to ensure good contact while the glue dried. When the top sheet is removed, the Homasote is tightly bonded to the plywood.



5) Here are a few thousand freshly stained ties waiting for me to glue them down and the spike rails. They'll have to wait a bit, though. I have a bunch of switches to build and I prefer to get them placed and the switch ties down before laying the connecting ties. If I have to change something a little bit, it's a whole lot easier to adjust a run of track than it is to put a switch where it doesn't quite fit.


## **BOB NEILL RECOGNIZED WITH LAROE AWARD**

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## MODULAR GROUP UPDATE BY TERRY ROSS

To begin our 2024 Season, we started with a busy January and February as we attended two shows within 3 weeks of each other.

The McPherson Train Show was Jan. 13<sup>th</sup> and 14<sup>th</sup> and if you remember, the temperatures were in the single digits or subzero most of the weekend. We had 9 members bring modules, corners, and gloves to complete a new "L" shaped layout measuring 20' x 20' Square x 36' x 8' leg. We added one new inside corner and two







transition modules (6') each to create the new "L" extension on the layout. It's hard to explain the measurement, so please come and see us at the next show. It was really fun running the trains on the large layout. Our long trains, (some with 30 cars or more) really look good on the long runs and big sweeping turns. We had an awesome mix of trains to show the public ranging from a Santa Fe Freight with 3 "Blue and Yellow" SD 45's to a UP Big Boy pulling an excursion UP Passenger Train. The cold weather kept a lot of the vendors away from the show, but we had a nice steady flow of rail fans come by the layout both Saturday and Sunday. After a great weekend of running trains, it was still super cold when we packed up to go home. Even with the cold, everyone said "I had a great time and would do it again."

And we did do it again, three weeks later at the "Best Train Show in Wichita" Feb. 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4th. It was a lot warmer when we set up, and we all enjoyed the heat. At Wichita, we again added to the layout as two members brought their new modules for the first time. Radford Walker brought his 4' module with a riverbed and bridge over the river, all under construction. Looks great already and created a lot of conversation as people could see how the scenery was being constructed. Adam Goldsmith brought his four beautifully done 4' modules complete with scenery and with working signals and crossing lights.

With the extra modules we again had to change the footprint of the layout to get as much as we could in the space we were given. This time we set up a "U - shaped" layout with two 180-degree corners on the end of the "U" to create an aisle down the center for the public to walk in and see the 22 feet of modules in the inside of the layout. We had seventeen 4' modules, two 6' transition modules, and eight corners to make a 20' x 28' U-shaped layout. We had seven modules we did not use at this show, plus four new member modules that are being worked on. We have had a growth explosion in our first year. We can really put together an interesting layout for future shows. Everyone had a great time running at the Wichita Show, and again we broke out some new equipment we had not seen before. A beautiful set of 3 Rock Island Jeeps, a UP DD40 Centennial, a Southern RR Steamer in Crescent Green, and a Northern Pacific Mountain, both smoking and chuffing around the layout. Oh yeah, kids we had plenty. Ken's 9-year-old grandson ran trains with us on Saturday for about 2 hours. His dad had to drag him away to a basketball game. Future Member and Clinic Presenter.

Adam's wife and NMRA member Ladena put together a scavenger hunt for the kids. They had to find about 20 miscellaneous items she had placed on the layout. If you found them all, you received a Tootsie Roll Pop as a prize. We also had a number of kids running trains and having a great time, even with Charlie trying to steal all the kids away with his "take home mini-modular







table" set up right next to us. He was too busy building mini-modules to come over and run trains with us. Great job Charlie!!

Well, I could go on and on, but I'll finish with "Join in the fun – come out and see us at one of our future shows." Run some trains with us, or just look and visit with friends. We would be happy to see you. We will be at the Belaire Community Building March 22nd and 23rd, and at the Arkansas City Train Show Saturday April 20th. Hope to see you there!!

### BOTANICA IS STILL LOOKING FOR A TRAIN TECHNICIAN DO YOU KNOW SOMEONE WHO MIGHT BE INTERESTED?

Initially this will be a Train Technician position. The Train Technician will be learning for 6 months to a year. I believe that it will be a part time, paid position that will lead to becoming the Botanica Train Coordinator (also a part time paid position, but with more hours).

A current summary of the Coordinator position is:

The job of the Coordinator is to make sure trains run as requested in an attractive setting. This involves ensuring there are:

- 1) volunteers to run the trains
- 2) functional trains with well working tracks and power system
- 3) buildings and accessories in good condition
- 4) that the plantings are appropriate and adequate.

The Coordinator reports to the Director of Operations and works in collaboration with the Volunteer Coordinator.

This position falls under the non-profit Botanica, Inc., rather than being a city of Wichita employee.

The position is a Permanent Part-time paid position with 20 to 30 hours per week that are flexible according to need.

#### A List of Qualifications preferred:

#### <u>Hard skills</u>

- At least a general knowledge of model train equipment, preferably G-scale.
- Have routinely cleaned and repaired model train equipment, preferably G-scale.
- Competent in MS Word and Excel for reports and schedules.

- At least a general knowledge of small scale horticulture appropriate for a train garden setting.
- Working knowledge of electricity and electronics.
- Capable of using diagnostic and small hand tools.
- Prefer someone capable of physical activity in the train shed or garden itself, such as standing, reaching, bending, stooping, kneeling, crawling, or lifting, up to 20 pounds. This might take place in any weather condition.

#### Soft skills

- Previous leadership or supervisory experience and is aware that supervising volunteers is different than supervising paid employees.
- Can deal with public positively and effectively as an operator or giving a presentation.
- Dependable.
- Open minded with personnel and new ideas.
- Can solve problems.
- Adaptable to changing processes and schedules.

#### Willingness and ability to learn is more important than any extended formal education.
